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Cancer Improvement Collaborative

A National Collaborative Project (CCLG and ODNs) addresses the experience of Children with LD & / or Autism and their experience of X-Rays has been developed to inform the Cancer Improvement Collaborative nationally. This is an NHS England programme across Paediatric and Adult Services.

The project is looking at whether we know enough in cancer services about supporting people with learning disabilities and autism to improve their experiences of scans and interventions.

The CCLG need our help to gather data and insights to better understand what this experience is like for families and staff, and explore whether, by working with experts in the field of LD and autism, we can improve the experience of X-Rays which are a significant and ongoing part of cancer care, through improving awareness and confidence in the teams.

The project will focus on gathering the views of parents and carers through empathy maps and interviews and we will need help regionally to identify patients that have LD and or autism to feed into this.

Collaborative Working

"Emmie's kitchen was set up in 2018, after our daughter Emmie was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia a ged 8. After spending lots of time at RMCH, the importance of the parent role in the care of their poorly child became very



apparent, parents also need to be thought about especially around access to nutritious food and basic supplies. Initially Emmie's kitchen provided a free 3 course meal for parents and carers at Ronald McDonald House, this provided a short time away from the clinical environment of the hospital to be looked after and nurtured by our fantastic team of volunteers. Due to Covid our offer had to change and the need for parents to have access to food was even more paramount Since May 2020, we delivered over hot meals every Friday night to 100 parents staying with their poorly child in RMCHevery two weeks this includes Ward 86 Oncology and Haematology ward at RMCH.

We initially identified the need of parents childhood diagnosis with а cancer but guickly recognised that the same needs applied right across the children's hospital. Emmie now aged 14, continues to drive the charity and volunteers most weeks , she often provides hope for many parents and children who currently are in treatment / inpatient."
