A Transformational Build for







Thanks the incredible generosity of BBC Children in Need and the team at DIY SOS, The Joshua Tree has undergone a remarkable transformation. The new build has created four counselling rooms, complementary therapy rooms, a dedicated therapeutic play space, wraparound accessible gardens, a fully equipped gym, a vibrant teen space, and two overnight accommodation pods.

These new facilities mean we can support more families, from a wider geographical area, in more ways than ever before. Whether it's through counselling, play therapy, fitness and wellbeing, or short stays in our family pods, the expanded space enables us to provide tailored, holistic support for children and families affected by childhood cancers. We are also proud to have our dedicated **hub in North Wales**, based at Penrhos Manor, which provides a welcoming space for families across the region. From there, we can deliver counselling, therapeutic play, family support sessions, and community events, ensuring that Welsh families have access to the same high-quality, personalised support closer to home.

Alongside this, our outreach vehicle continues to play a vital role in bringing support directly into the heart of local communities. By reducing the need for families to travel long distances, it ensures that vital services are accessible, helping us to contribute to the Operational Delivery Network's mission of care closer to home.
